MY DEAR PEOPLE,

Looking back over the Lent that has gone, I am more than thankful that the good congregations were maintained all through the solemn Forty Days, including Good Friday. We were particularly fortunate in having Mr. Browell to conduct the Three Hours' Service. His addresses were most practical and helpful, and many have spoken in grateful appreciation of them.

The Choir did themselves and Mr. Russe great credit in their rendering of Stainer's Crucifixion. We hope in the future that they will be heard to as great advantage in other works.

It was a great joy to me to have such large congregations on Easter Day, and I am sure that all who worshipped in St. James's Church must have had a very happy Easter. The reverent and pleasing rendering of the musical portions of the services added not a little to our Easter joy, and we are grateful to the Choir for their help. The Church was tastefully decorated, and we owe a debt of gratitude to all who sent flowers, as well as to the decorators. I am most grateful for the kind way in which you showed your appreciation of my first year's work amongst you.

I am afraid this month's Magazine will be somewhat dull, as it will be full of statement of accounts, and figures are not as a rule interesting or inspiring; and yet underlying the bald statements there are certain interesting facts, and one of these facts is that on one account only is there a debit balance, and this is on the Blanchard Charity Account. The explanation of this is that the two Charities, the Blanchard and Fitz-Wygram Charities are worked as one account for the relief of the poor of the Parish. If you deduct the adverse balance on the Blanchard account, from the credit balance on the Fitz-Wygram account, you will see that on the two there is a balance in hand.

To the Assessment scheme we owe the balance of f175 on the Churchwardens' account. I would remind you, however, that in order to preserve this account in its present flourishing condition, it is necessary to add to the number who at present have assessed themselves for this year. For one reason or another some people are not able to continue their assessment, and we have to rely on others to take their place. I hope many more will join the scheme this year, as I feel sure it is the only possible way of running the accounts of the Church on a business-like footing. One always looks forward to the time when this scheme will entirely displace collections in Church. Another account which I would draw your attention to is the Magazine account. The fact that we have here a balance in hand of f_{40} is entirely due to the untiring energy of our Secretary, Mr. Simmons. To him we owe a very deep debt of gratitude, and we hope he may long be spared to continue his useful and profitable piece of parochial work.

Looking forward, we have to fix our attention on the Summer Fête, and we hope to make it a great social and financially beneficial event this year. The Fund which will have to benefit most from this year's effort is the Nurse Fund. Our Nurse has been doing excellent work, and has won her way to the affection of the people, and we must see to it that the work does not suffer for lack of funds.

The Jumble Sale was quite a success, and realised a sum of £19 9s, 10d. Part of the net profits will go to the Nurse Fund and the rest to the Day Schools Sports' Fund.
