My DEAR PEOPLE,

I wish you all a very happy and prosperous New Year. True happiness and prosperity depend to a very large extent on how far we live for and are interested in other people. often one hears the remark "I keep myself very much to myself." That is as good as saving I am self-interested, I live only for myself. Such people are as a general rule neither truly happy nor very prosperous. I think we could very well take as our motto for this year, "Fellowship." It means simply this:—Loving my neighbour as myself, doing to all men as I would they should do unto me, being thoughtful, courteous and kind to all, strictly just and honest in my dealings with my fellow men, being peace-makers and not agitators of strife, in fact, taking an active interest in all that concerns the life of other people. Let this spirit of fellowship begin in the home so that there may be a revival of ideal family life. Take it with you into your business and social life, and above all let it be manifested in your religious life. Fellowship was the very foundation of the early life of the Church of Christ, may we see it in the life of the Church to-day. We cannot be in fellowship with Jesus without being in fellowship with one another.

Will you please take note of two Festivals this month which fall on week-days. The Feast of the Circumcision is one, and the Feast of the Epiphany is the other. On these two occasions I have made an alteration in the times of the Celebrations of the Holy Communion, which you will find under the Parish News. It is fitting that as many as possible should be able to make their Communions on New Year's Day, and at

the Epiphany, and I hope the 7 o'clock service will be used by some who have to catch early trains. While we are on the subject may I say that there might be an improvement at the daily Celebration. Perhaps the time, 7.30, is not suitable. How would you like this service to be held at 7 o'clock on three mornings, and at 8 o'clock on the other three mornings of the week? I should be glad to hear from any to whom this suggestion commends itself.

Two children's functions take place this month. The Sunday School Prize Giving, which is fixed for January 10th, and the Band of Hope Christmas Party. For these events we shall require about 300 buns and 300 oranges. I shall be pleased to receive contributions towards these two items.

You will notice under the Parish News that I have put down a service of preparation for Holy Communion on January 26th. I want to revive the Communicant's Guild, and at this service I shall put before you suggestions about the Guild and take names of those who would like to become members. I hope, therefore, that all communicants will endeavour to be present.

The Bishop of London has promised to visit the parish on Sunday, February 22nd, for the evening service. It is many years since he was last amongst us, and I am sure you will all take this opportunity of seeing and hearing him.

I have been fortunate in securing the help of two new district visitors. There are still several vacancies, and I should be grateful if others would come forward and offer to take a district.

We badly need three teachers for the Boys' Sunday School. I hope these vacancies will soon be filled.
