MY DEAR PEOPLE,

It gives me great joy and a deep sense of thankfulness, that in these days when there is much pessimistic talk about the influence of the Church, we have, in the steady increase in congregations noted here and there, indications that the church's influence is not on the wane. I believe that in the days of re-action immediately after the strain of war the Spiritual leven was quietly working, and that now we are beginning to see the result of the imperceptible growth of the seed which the Church has been sowing. The Rogation days are set apart by the Church as Days of Abstinence and Prayer for God's blessing on the fruits of the Earth as well as on the fruits of the Spirit. I hope many will be present at the 7.30 a.m. Holy Communion, on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and at the Intercession Services at noon each day, and 8 p.m. on Wednesday. Also I hope for a better observance of Ascension Day.

The last Day of May is Whitsun Day. Please make a note of the times of the Celebration of the Holy Communion. Gifts of flowers for the decorations will be gratefully received on Saturday, May 30th, between nine and ten o'clock in the morning.
