My DEAR PEOPLE,

It is gratifying to be able to note an improvement in the keeping of the Feast of the Ascension. Because it happens to fall on a weekday many are apt to forget it. In time, however, I hope that the number of communicants on that day will bare comparison with the total for the other great Church Festivals.

I am pleased to be able to announce that at a recent examination in connection with the Church of England Temperance Society, one of the members of our Band of Hope obtained the Rural Dean's prize. We heartily congratulate her, and also that threeothers obtained certificates. Owing to lack of time, the Band of Hope was unable to produce their Cantata before the session closed, but we hope to have it ready for performance early in the Autumn.

Confirmation Classes are occupying most of our time just now. Will you please remember in your prayers the Candidates who are to be Confirmed on Monday, June 29th, at Hampton Wick, especially those from this Parish.

It was with the utmost regret that we received the news that Mr. Basey was retiring from the Headmastership of our Schools. He has held that position for thirty-five years, a big slice out of his life. During that period he has endeared himself to all amongst whom and with whom he has worked, and there are many men and lads in our village, yes, and in many parts of the world, who are grateful for having come under his influence and training. He carries with him into his retirement the very best of wishes from hundreds of friends who hope he will long be spared to enjoy a well earned rest after so many

years of faithful labour. Please remember the School Managers in your prayers, and ask for God's guidance for them in their choice of a new Headmaster.

During the winter months, some of our Sunday School Teachers have been attending classes in the neighbourhood, arranged by the Bishop of London's Sunday School Council. We have just heard that one of them, Miss A. Barnes, has passed the test in Church History which qualifies her in one subject of a course for the Diocesan Certificate. Miss Barnes is to be congratulated on her success, and I hope other teachers will follow her example.

The members of the Mothers' Union are anticipating a trip to Brighton by char-a-banc on Friday, July 3rd. There may possibly be a limited number of vacancies for non-members. Application for these should be made to Mrs. Kestin, "Isledon," Wellington Road, as soon as possible.

It is probable that our Annual Fête will be held on Wednesday, July 22nd. Please book the date and look out for further announcements.

Last month much space was occupied in bringing to your notice the financial statements of the parish. From the statement of the Church Expenses Account we see there is a fairly large balance in the Bank to our credit. There are, however, one or two things for us to remember ere we fold our hands and imagine that funds are not in need of as great support as we have given them in the past. First of all, as in every other walk of life, expenses are going up. Then the amount received from the Assessment Scheme is dropping, and this is the experience common to all such parochial efforts after the first two or three years. Also we must not forget that up to now we have not had a permanent full-time

Curate. There is at present a shortage of Curates, but when I can find one for our parish it will be necessary to offer him £250 per annum if single, and £300 if married. As our finances stand at present we shall just pay our way with a Curate at the annual stipend of £250. This means that our effort with regard to the Assessment Scheme must not be slackened. Others must be found to take the place of those who have dropped out. It also means that those who do not belong to the Scheme must remember that they are still required to subscribe to such things as the Assistant Clergy Fund, the Sunday Schools and the C.L.B., as they were in the days before the starting of the Scheme, in addition to the amount given at the Sunday collections. It would indeed save a lot of time if you would send your subscriptions to these various objects without being asked personally. Why not join or rejoin the Assessment Scheme and earmark part of your contribution for the special objects which you fancy most? Anyhow don't neglect your obligation and leave the financial burden on the shoulders of the few.

The Committee in charge of the voluntary work in the Churchyard have asked me to appeal for helpers. Work on the Churchyard will commence on Wednesday, June 3rd, and after that the regular days for work will be Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, any time after seven o'clock. The Committee would gladly welcome additional assistance, and they would also be glad if volunteers will bring shears with them.
