My DEAR PEOPLE,

Mr. Milton will be starting his work amongst us this month, and I am sure you will all give him a hearty welcome. Unfortunately we could not find rooms for him actually in the parish; but his address will be "Coniston," Broad Lane, Hampton. One of the results of having another on the staff will be that the visiting will be more thoroughly done than it was when I was working single-handed. There are, I know, a number of people who come to church and whom I do not know, but in a short time I hope none in the parish will be able to say that the parson has not called on them, and if those who worship here, but live outside the parish, will leave their names and addresses with the Verger, they also will be called upon.

The Thanksgiving Services for Harvest will be on the Second Sunday in this month. All the flowers, fruit and vegetables, etc. that are sent for decorating the Church or offered at the Children's Service will be sent to the St. Mary's Cottage Hospital at Hampton. In addition to the Hospitals and Surgical Aid Society, we hope to be able to give a portion of the collections this year to the Hampton Philanthropic Society, which is keeping its Jubilee this year. This Society has done a lot of useful work in this parish and is well worthy of our support.

The Bishop of London has once more called the Diocese to a week of Prayer and Self-Denial. It is to be held from November 15th to the 22nd. Full particulars of the Services, etc., to be held in this parish will appear in the next issue of the Magazine. In preparation for this important spiritual effort, The Bishop of Kensington is visiting the Deanery on Saturday, October 17th. He is anxious to meet the members of the Parochial Church Councils and all others interested in Church Work at the Town Hall, Twickenham, from 3.30 to 5.30 p.m. I do hope that most of our Councillors and many others will make a special effort to go. Tickets at 1/- each (including Tea), may be had from me.

I have been asked by several members of the congregation to have the Holy Communion sung all the way through on one Sunday in the month, and we are going to begin to do this on the third Sunday in each month. This simply means that instead of the Choir going out after the prayer for the Church Militant, they will remain in their places and sing those parts in the rest of the Service which are usually sung. I have also been asked to have the Litany on one Sunday in the month, and I propose having it on the Second Sunday unless the Sunday happens to be a Saint's Day or great Festival.

From Monday, October 12th, Evensong will be said daily at half-past five. I have put it at this hour because it seems to me to be the best to assure a congregation.

Our Annual Sale of Work for the various Missionary Societies which we support will take place on the last Wednesday in the month, in the Girls' School from three o'clock. I hope this effort may be a record. This will depend, however, on a large increase of gifts to the various stalls and a crowd of buyers. We hope to have our band to brighten the proceedings, and an extra special concert as a further attraction.

Miss Griffiths has kindly promised to give us a concert in the Boys' School, on Friday, October 30th. I feel sure that we shall have a full house on that evening, and that the Nurse Fund will be considerably augmented by the proceeds.
