My DEAR PEOPLE,

The thoughts of many are at the moment concerned about the keeping of Armistice Day, and much has been written in the "press" on the scandal of merry-making on this day, with which most of us will agree. But how are we particularly going to mark the day? As is usual we shall have services in keeping with the occasion on Sunday, November 8th. I hope, however, that many will come to the various services on the day itself. There really ought to be a full church at a quarter-to-eleven, and surely most of the relatives of those who names are inscribed on the Memorial in the churchyard could be present at one of the Memorial Communion Services if they tried. You will find a list of Services under the Parish News. Our alms at the eleven o'clock Service on November 8th, will be divided between Earl Haig's Fund for distressed Ex-Service Men and our Churchyard Fund.

We have been called by our Bishop to observe the week from November 15th to 22nd, as a Week of Prayer and Self-Denial. In this rather selfish age there is a danger of becoming selfishly parochial, and in our prayers and alms-giving forgeting any other needs than our own. It is well then that once a year we should widen our outlook and join with all the other parishes in the Diocese to pray for and to help on the work of the Diocese as a whole by definite acts of self-denial. Lord Justice Bankes, speaking at the London Diocesan Conference, said that the spirit he wanted to see in all parishes was the "Team" spirit. Let us try and put that spirit into our Week of Prayer and Self-Denial and do our part

in the great Diocesan Team for the good of the whole. The subject at our Services of Intercession will be "Prayer," and the Bishop has suggested that we try to re-think the thoughts of Christ, so that we may the better able to pray in Christ's name. I would also ask you to make the selfdenial a real part of the week. Give up something you usually have for the week and put what you generally spend upon it into the envelopes provided for the purpose and place them in the box at the west end of the Church, on Sunday, November 22nd, or send them to me. The sum realised in this manner will go towards our quota of ambition for the Diocesan Fund which this year stands at £72. The services for the week will be given under the Parish News.

The prize-giving in the Girls' Department of our Day Schools was a very happy function. Mrs. Wheatley very kindly distributed the prizes, and I feel sure that her words to the children after the distribution of prizes will give them greater zest for their work and encourage them to do even better work than they have done in the past.

The Band of Hope are giving their Cantata, "Idle Ben," on Friday, November 13th. Children's entertainments are generally popular, so we anticipate a full house on this occasion.

The Rev. F. W. Kelland, S.P.G., Organizing Secretary for the London Diocese will preach on Sunday, November 22nd, in the morning. I hope to organise a Missionary School for the Parish early next year. This is an effort which is being made in many parishes in the Deanery to give the people an opportunity of learning more than most of them know about the duty of all christian people to take a practical interest in the work of the Church Overseas. I propose, therefore, that on eight consecutive Mondays, beginning on

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February 1st, 1926, as many as possible shall meet in the Church Room at 8 o'clock. For the first forty minutes, we shall have a lecture on some such subject as "God and the word to-day," "The Vocation of the Parish," etc. At the end of the lecture, and after a brief interval, the members of the "school" will split up into various groups and discuss the subject, and then the findings of the groups will be submitted to the whole meeting. I do hope we may have a good "school." I shall be able to give further details in the January magazine.
