My DEAR PEOPLE.

During last month there were three events which should tend to give a spiritual uplift to the Parish while binding us together in a closer fellowship with one another and with the Church at large. Our Armistice Commemoration displayed a spirit amongst people for which we have long been working and praying, viz., a spirit of real religion. One was truly thankful to find that at heart the nation was becoming more seriously minded and more willing to respond to the call of God. Following this came our Week of Prayer, an opportunity of fanning the re-kindled spark of spiritual fervour into a larger flame and of cementing Diocesan Fellowship. And then we had our Day of Intercession for the work of the Church Overseas, which gave us a broarder spiritual outlook and brought into closer contact the whole of the Christian Church. We must not, however, consider these special efforts as ends in themselves, but taking them as signs of opportunity, we must work with a will to improve the golden chance of furthering the cause of Christ. As far as our Parish is concerned, such endeavours should lead to an increase of the Christian Spirit amongst us, a much larger attendance at public worship, and a greater eagerness of the regular Churchgoers to make more use of the week-day services, and especially the daily celebration of the Holy Communion.

We are again at the beginning of the Advent season, and I hope that many will be moved to attend the special Advent service on the Wednesdays before Christmas at 8 o'clock. On the Tuesday before Christmas Day we are having a Carol Service in Church at 8 o'clock. The

collection at this service will be for the Choir Fund.

I would draw your attention to the Christmas services which you will find under the Parish News. The collections on Christmas Day will go to the Sick and Poor Fund. May we all remember the real point of the Christmas Festival, the nativity of the Prince of Peace, and be particular to let our worship of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, have our first thoughts and attention on His Natal Day. I shall be grateful for gifts of flowers and evergreens for the decoration of the Church. They should be sent to the Church on Thursday, December 24th, between 9.30 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. Flowers at this time of the year are scarce, but if you all sent a few there would be sufficient to worthily adorn the House of God.

The Concert for the Nurse Fund, kindly organised by Miss Griffiths, was a great success. The result of this effort was that nearly fourteen pounds was handed over to the Fund.

On Friday, December 4th, Mr. Alford and the Teachers of the Day Schools are giving a Concert to inaugurate a Fund for the purchasing of a new piano. The present instrument has done service for about 20 years, so it is time we had a new one. A feature of the Concert will be some items given by an Orchestral Society which Mr. Alford is bringing from Ashford. I hope this effort will receive the support of all.

The Band of Hope is giving an Entertainment in the Boys' Schoolroom, on Friday, December 18th, at 8 p.m. Included in the programme is a performance of the Operetta, "Idle Ben." We hope to have a crowded house on this occasion.
