MY DEAR PEOPLE,

Homelife at the Vicarage has been much disorganized since last January through a double attack of measles, and my wife and I would extend our most sincere thanks for the many kind enquiries that have been made. At times such as we have been going through it is a great comfort to have your sympathy.

Our Lenten Fast is drawing to a close; the most important day of the whole solemn season, however, is Good Friday, and I do hope that all of you will so arrange your domestic affairs that you will be able to be present in Church during the Three Hours' Service, from 12 to 3 p.m., which is being conducted by the Rev. F. Marriott, Vicar of St. Peter's, Staines. To share the Saviour's sufferings by watching at the foot of the Cross will help us the better to enter into the joy of Easter Day, as we gather together with our brethren in the Lord to receive from Him that great and ever precious gift of Himself, our spiritual sustenance and strength. Please note the times of services on Easter Day, which you will find under the Parish News. I shall be grateful for gifts of flowers, etc., for the decoration of the Church. Will you please send them to the Church early on Saturday morning?

Our Confirmation Classes are beginning on Monday, April 12th, when I hope to meet all intending candidates in the Church at 8 o'clock, in order to have a preliminary talk with them and to arrange suitable times for future classes.

Our effort on behalf of the work of the Church Overseas can claim another success in the meeting held in the Church Room last month. Miss Holcroft, who had worked in India, gave a very interesting address and during the handing round of tea chatted with many of those present. With the help given by some who were not able to be present, the collection amounted to three pounds eleven shillings and sixpence.

On Monday, April 19th, we are to have a Cinematograph Exhibiton and Lecture entitled: "The Great Wide West," and given by the Rev. E. H. Griffiths, late of the Royal Navy. In this exhibition we shall be shown the work that the Church is doing for the British Settlers and Indians in the continent of South America. We are charging a small sum for admission towards defraying expenses, but we hope that all who attend will give a contribution towards this work which is being carried on by the South American Missionary Society as they go out from the lecture.

I am glad to be able to tell you that two friends have promised the coloured burses and veils which I asked for last month.

We are printing this month the Churchwardens' Statement of Accounts for last year. You will see that there was a balance of over two hundred pounds. We are not likely to see such a balance at the end of this year unless there is a great increase in the number of those joining the Assessment Scheme. By removals and deaths we lost over sixty pounds last year, which means that we require the addition of at least thirty members who will give a shilling a week. Considering the number of new people in the parish, it ought not to be difficult to obtain these few new subscribers. Of course we gladly welcome smaller weekly payments, even from a penny a week and upwards.

On April 30th, I hope to give a concert in the Boys' School. Please be on the look-out for bills announcing this event. The proceeds will be divided between the new Parochial Hall Fund and the Mothers' Union Banner Fund.
