My DEAR PEOPLE,

I am writing my letter to you at the close, of what has been a very restful and enjoyable holiday. August, from a parochial point of view is an "off" month, there is, as a rule, nothing to report. However, before talking about future events, there is one function which took place on the eve of my departure from home which I must mention. The Quarterly Meeting of the Mothers' Union was held on July 28th. After the afternoon Service in Church, the members adjourned to the Vicarage Garden for tea and competitions. The various competitions were keenly contested, the most amusing of all being the egg and spoon race. Mrs. Kestin had provided several prizes which were presented by Mrs. Whittet at the end of the afternoon. We owe a very great debt of gratitude to Mrs. Kestin for the amount of trouble she takes with this important branch of parochial life. She never spares herself in her interested eagerness that all meetings in connection with the Mothers' Union shall be successful. Through her untiring energy the membership is steadily growing, and I know she has great hopes that many of the younger mothers who have come into the parish recently will become members. The monthly meeting is proving quite an attraction. I hope during the coming winter to be able to arrange for some experts to come and talk to the mothers on topics which are pressing in these days when, as Prebendary Mackay told us in an article in the Church Times of a week or two ago, people are living without ideals and any strong principles and families are -cohering from necessity, but would break up and scatter if the opportunity occurred.

It is nearly a year since Mr. Milton came to work amongst us. Since he came work has been going steadily ahead. In a short time we shall be able to say that there is not a house in the parish which has not been visited by the clergy. We congratulate Mr. Milton on having passed through the two stages of his Priest's Examination, and our thoughts and prayers will be with him when he goes into retreat on the thirtieth of this month, and especially on Sunday, October 3rd, when he will be ordained Priest in St. Paul's Cathedral.

Some of the candidates whom I prepared for Confirmation last time have asked me whether it would be possible to have a Celebration of the Holy Communion on one Sunday in the month at seven o'clock in the morning, as domestic duties make it almost impossible for them to get to the eight o'clock Celebration. In future, therefore, there will be a Celebration on the second Sunday in the month at seven o'clock, beginning on Sunday, September 12th.

The various winter organisations will all be starting again this month. The Lads' Club is the first to re-open with a General Meeting on September the first. We are all hoping that Mr. Willis will be sufficiently recovered from his serious accident to continue his good work amongst the lads.

The Band of Hope will begin early in the month and we hope for a considerable increase in membership. It is difficult to hold the children in these days when so many attractions, which are more exciting than Band of Hope Meetings, are put in their way. We shall try, however, to provide a programme this season which will be very attractive.
