The unexpected very often happens. At any rate it was so with regard to the attitude of the House of Commons towards the Prayer Book Measure. Having been accepted in the House of Lords by a good majority, most people expected that it would pass the Commons, even though the majority in its favour may be small. However, the expectation of the greater number of Churchpeople was doomed to disappointment, and years of labour on the part of the Archbishop of Canterbury and his colleagues seemed to end in abject failure.

Our sympathy is with the venerable Metropolitan in what must have been one of the saddest moments of his long life. The Church has indeed received a decided set-back, and there are any number of gloomy forebodings with regard to the future. I cannot believe that the result of the rejection of the Measure will be such a terrible disaster, nor do I see why it should hasten the day of Disestablishment. One thing we all hoped would result from an Alternative Book of Common Prayer was that a greater spirit of unity would prevail amongst the various schools of thought in the Church. But since we have for a time been disappointed of our hope in this direction, perhaps it is not too presumptuous on my part to believe that this spirit of unity may still be possible of attainment even without a New Prayer Book. In fact, I would make it my New Year's Message to you that we all pray and work much harder than we have ever done before for greater unity amongst ourselves. This, however, can only come about by being much more tolerant to one another. We must try and respect the other man's point of view.

Our Christmas Festival was a very happy time.

The services were most encouraging, the Midnight Celebration especially proving the satisfying of a need. The number of communicants and the hearty way in which they sang the old familiar hymns was an inspiration. At all the Celebrations of the Holy Communion the numbers were well above the average. The collections were also better, the total for the day being over £17. The choir sang very nicely—several members of the congregation have told me how much they enjoyed the singing. I am deeply grateful to all who sent flowers and evergreens for the decorations, and to the decorators.

For some time I have been much exercised about the opportunities given to parents for bringing their infants to the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. Officially there has been only one Sunday in the month for the administration of the Sacrament. In future there will be three times in each month-two on Sundays and one on a weekday. Particulars will be found under the Parish News. May I remind parents of the necessity of securing the requisite number of God-parents - two God-fathers and one Godmother for a boy, and two God-mothers and one God-father for a girl. Of course the parents may count as one of each.

This year I very much want to take the choir boys to the circus at Olympia, instead of to a pantomime, as I think the boys will enjoy it better. It will be a little more costly, but I feel sure that you all appreciate the work the boys put in at practice, etc., and will send me subscriptions at once to help give the boys a really enjoyable afternoon.

It is my great desire that the Parochial Church Council should be a much more effective part of the Church's machinery. In order to achieve this end, a greater interest must be taken in the Parochial Church Meeting, and the privileges and

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responsibility of those who are eligible to attend that meeting and elect members on to the Parochial Church Council. It is only in this way that the meetings and elections can be really live things, and the Parochial Church Council a truly representative body. I hope to have many nominations of people willing to serve on the Parochial Church Council sent in before January 20th. The number to be elected are twenty-four-twelve ladies and twelve gentlemen. Will you all take advantage of your privileges, and show a lively interest in matters concerning your Church? Nothing would please me more than to have a packed meeting at the Boys' School on Tuesday, January 24th, and a really exciting contest for membership on the Council.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.—It is just a year since the Missionary Association was formed with the object of extending knowledge of the work of the Church Overseas. Now that we have, so to speak, got into our stride, we hope that many more members of the congregation will come to the meetings and join in the discussions; those who "don't approve of Missions" will be specially welcome.
