MY DEAR PEOPLE,

It cannot be said that the three great Festivals of the Church which occurred last month secured any worthy attention from the majority of those who call themselves Churchmen in this Parish. When all allowance is made for those who were spending the holiday away from home, under two hundred Communicants on Whit Sunday does not compare favourably with over four hundred on Easter Day. You may remember an incident in the life of Jesus upon this earth when He healed ten men who were lepers, and how He drew attention to the fact that only one of those men returned to acknowledge publicly his gratitude for the blessing of restored health. Our Lord's words were, "Were there not ten cleansed, but where are the nine? There are not found that returned to give glory to God save this stranger." I often think it is the same to-day. God through his Church is ever pouring His benefits upon the thousands in this Parish, and yet but a mere handful return and publicly acknowledge their gratitude for His Holy Church in their midst. It is not that you don't appreciate having the Church with its Ministry of the Word and Sacraments at your very You have merely become careless; or perhaps you are leaving such things for the evening of your lives when the world has less ittraction for you; or may be you think you would ather wait to return thanks until you meet him in Of course it is within the realm of ossibility that you will not see old age, but will be alled hence in the heyday of life. And what if hen you do meet Him, He does not recognise ou! That also is in the realm of possibility for ou remember His answer to those whom He nagined as desiring recognition from Him in the

Kingdom of Heaven. "I never knew you, depart from me, ye that work iniquity." "How shall we escape," says the writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews, "if we neglect so great a salvation." In the carrying out of our salvation here below, public thanksgiving in the Church's worship has a definite place.

I would ask your prayers for all who are being prepared for Confirmation. There may be some who for one reason or another have not yet joined the Classes. I shall be pleased to see them and arrange extra classes for them so that they may be presented on July 16th, at Hampton Parish Church.

As time is speeding on we shall have the holidays rather upsetting our course of preparation for the Students' Missionary Campaign in this Parish in September.

I take this opportunity of refreshing your memories about the object of the visit of two Undergraduates to this Parish from September 21st to 25th. These young men are coming to arouse the interest, particularly amongst the young people, in the work of the Church as a whole, and specially in lands overseas. During this month I hope to have a meeting of all who have charge of the young people in Hampton Hill, in order to map out a definite programme. The programme will not consist entirely of meetings for young people. We shall hope to stir up a much keener interest amongst adults in Missionary Work abroad.

Before our next issue is in your hands the Sunday School Treat will be quite upon us. You will find particulars of this Outing under Parish News. Here I would only say how very grateful I should be for donations towards the expense of the Treat. Will you please send them to me before the end of this month.
