My DEAR PEOPLE,

It is customary just now to be wishing each other a Bright and Prosperous New Year. I do indeed hope that 1930 may be for you all a year rich in blessings and true happiness. But what is the meaning of this familiar greeting? Well, it just depends in what spirit it is given. It may merely convey a hope that one's friends will have their full share of all the fun and enjoyment which the world has to dispense and that in business good fortune may smile upon them. It may, however, be the expression of an earnest desire for the well-being of our friends whatever the future may have in store for them. Few of us are likely to go through the next twelve months care-free and yet in spite of anxieties and even sorrows we may never be devoid of all happi-And further as far as prosperity is concerned our wish if sincere does not mean that we hope all our friends will amass large fortunes but rather that success may follow in the wake of every endeavour made to fulfill the purpose for which they have been sent into the world; and it is in this sense that I wish you all a Happy New Year.

And now to turn to parochial matters. Before anticipating let us just glance back over the past year. I believe I am right in saying that some steady progress has been made. Although the congregations do not show any increase, there is no decrease in numbers and what is more a greater number individually have been coming to worship. Our Sunday School has been steadily growing and the afternoon Service is most encouraging. With regard to the organisations, the Band of Hope has nearly ninety children on

its roll of membership, the Lads' Club numbers over sixty members and is now meeting twice a week, a Girls' Club has lately been started which is steadily increasing in numbers and the Guides and Scouts are still going strong. We have not been able to have any social functions such as Dances or Concerts during the past year owing to the state of the Old School building and the fact that under the present circumstances we cannot get an entertainment licence, though we have had several lantern lectures on the Work of the Church Overseas which have been fairly well attended. In the matter of the alteration of the Old Boys' School Building into a Parish Hall we shall have something of interest and importance to report at the Annual Parochial Meeting which is to be held on Wednesday, January 22nd. We can say that great progress has been made in respect of this subject during the past twelve months. But what of the future? Well I am hoping that a more regular habit of churchgoing may result in larger congregations especially at the celebrations of the Holy Communion. I should also be glad if parents would see that their children were a little more regular in their attendance at Sunday School and I could wish for a far larger attendance at the afternoon Service of children not attached to the Sunday School. I am hoping to start a Junior Communicants' Guild to help our young communicants up to the age of eighteen years. service and meeting will be held in Church on Monday, January 13th, at 8 p.m., when I hope to see a number of young people. forward to the completion of the alterations to the school building before the autumn. There is one matter which should have our serious consideration and it is the matter of the assistance of a Curate. One priest cannot possibly do the work that should be done. The visiting alone

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requires two men constantly at it. What I feel is that if we all put our shoulders to the wheel we should soon have guaranteed a sufficient sum to support an assistant Priest, but we must all help. We have now two hundred and ninety names on the Electoral Roll and before the Annual Church Meeting it will reach three hundred. Supposing that fifty of these belong to the Assessment Scheme and are really bearing their full share in the Parochial Expenses there remains another two hundred and fifty. If these would promise only an extra sixpence a week each we should have sufficient to give a minimum stipend to a full time man. When you have your notice of the Annual Meeting, will you please send an intimation to me or to one of the Churchwardens that you are willing to do this? If only we all co-operate for the good of the Church and the spiritual welfare of the parish we shall be able to report great progress
