My DEAR PEOPLE,

Time only emphasizes the loss we have sustained in the death of Mr. Kestin. His genial. kindly manner won the affection of us all. It was a great shock to hear that he had passed away, especially as he was in his accustomed place in Church only a fortnight before. For a great number of years he was actively interested in everything that concerned the welfare of this parish, and there are many who still remember his delightful recitations at the various parochial concerts and entertainments. We who have come into the parish recently have but the memory of his beautiful reading of the lessons and that was a real Ministry of the Word, faithfully fulfilled through many years. Him hath God taken to higher work in heavenly places. Our heartfelt sympathy goes out to Mrs. Kestin in her sad bereavement and great loneliness, a solitude the greater because her son is so far away. We must

do all that we can to help to relieve her loneliness. The Lenten Season is once more with us.
