Vicar's Letter.

My DEAR PEOPLE.

There may be some who were not at Church on the first Sunday in Lent and who, in consequence, did not hear the Bishop's "Lent Pastoral." You will find it in the London Diocesan Leaflet at the end of this issue of the Magazine. It is well worth careful and thoughtful reading. You will notice that he tells us that repentance simply means "change of mind," in other words we want to have a different outlook. This, it seems, will apply to life in general. The prospect according to many is gloomy, but perhaps if we look at things from a different point of view, we may discover that they are not so bad and that we may revive a cheery hopefulness. The Lent Pastoral, however, has to do with the soul and our spiritual life, and I do think we want a different outlook on that. Most of us are well satisfied with our religious state as it is, and consequently there is not the response to the "call" of Lent that there might be. Let us try and change our mind about spiritual things. Let us give up being satisfied with the world's standard and the world's point of view, and let us look at

Christ's standard and His point of view. do this I am sure we shall not be conjuring up excuses for not observing the Lenten Fast more strictly, for not attending some of the extra services or making more frequent communions. Rather we shall look at our spiritual state as it is, and compare it with what Christ meant it to be and with what it might have been, but for our half-heartedness, and we shall make an effort in the way of spiritual renewal. It is too early to make any comment on the use we are making of the Lenten Services, but I do commend them again to your notice, hoping that they will be helpful to you.

You may have wondered why you have been given leaflets about the Forty-five Churches Fund and the Day of Self-Denial, on March 20th. The Bishop in his February letter, which you will find at the end of the February Magazine, writes fully concerning the matter. To put it simply, the Diocese as a whole, and our Parish particularly, has been asked to do two things to help provide Churches in the new districts in outer London, where nearly half a million people have been dumped without provision for their religious life. In the first place we are asked to observe March

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20th as a Day of Self-Denial. Envelopes will be distributed on Sunday, March 15th, and I want you definitely to deny yourself something on that day and to put the result in money in the envelope and bring it to Church. I shall be in Church from 11-11.30 in the morning, from 3.30-4 o'clock in the afternoon, and 7-7.30 and 9-9.30 in the evening to receive those envelopes. These envelopes, with your offerings, I shall take and present to our Rural Dean, who, in turn, will take them to Fulham Palace to present them to the Bishop for Dedication. I do hope that many will join this special effort as part of their Lenten discipline. The other way we can help is by becoming a Church Builder. This is by having a card and buying a stamp for 6d. weekly, until you have put 26/- on it. At the moment we cannot, as a parish, push this scheme, because we have to pay off the debt of the Parish Hall and do certain repairs inside and outside the Church. However, as the scheme is to run for three years, we may possibly be able to do our part later on.

Please read carefully the information given under "Missionary Association." The Missionary Exhibition is something quite new, and I hope there will be much enthusiasm aroused during the period of preparation from now to October. Do make an effort to attend the meeting in the Parish Hall, on March 5th. Our bus for the Albert Hall is to be one of the new large buses, holding 54 Please book your seats at once! Churchwardens have contributed an article on Finance in this Magazine. It is in anticipation of the Parish Budget which will be issued later. The important point for us to notice, is that we need more subscribers to the Assessment While we shall be grateful for the Scheme. promise of annual cheques, we shall be equally grateful for the promise of small weekly subscriptions from, say, twopence a week upwards. I notice that you are to hear something next month about "Clerical Assistance to the Vicar." The fact is that there is enough work for two Priests in this Parish, and the Churchwardens are anxious to have an Assistant Priest to do that work which I alone cannot possibly do. I shall be extremely glad to be told to look out for a colleague, because I am sure that the extension of God's Kingdom in the Parish will go forward directly there is an adequate staff.

The confirmation this year will take place at Hampton Wick towards the end of June. I hope to begin classes directly after Easter; in the meantime I should be glad to have names of intending candidates.

Finance.

This month we wish to put before readers, the state of the Parochial Church Council Account. During 1930, the expenditure exceeded the receipts by £22. This is not a serious matter, if it continues to be an exception and does not become a rule. In the present year there must be some extra expenditure under certain items, and to meet this and make up the loss last year, we estimate that the income must be increased by £51.

The increases are due to repairs which cannot be neglected. These are included under Church Expenses, as regards repairs to the Fabric of the Church, and under Choir Expenses, as regards repairs to the Organ. We hope that there will be decreased expenditure on account of the Churchyard.
