Vicar's Letter.

My DEAR PEOPLE,

The "call" this month is to a careful observance of the Lenten Fast. In these days of anxiety it does behove the faithful laity to betake themselves to prayer, and the forty days of Lent give opportunity for a special concentrated effort in prayer. Please pay particular attention to the arrangements for Lent which you will find elsewhere and which will be circulated later by bills. A new feature in these arrangements is the course of Devotional Instructions which are to be given in turn at the three Churches in the District of Hampton. The Rev. Eric Hamilton is to be the conductor which in itself should be sufficient to ensure large congregations. This is quite a new departure from the ordinary Wednesday Lent Services and I fear there are some who are so conservative that they are not pleased at being taken out of the usual monotonous rut of Lent observance. We are having the second two of the five services in our own Church and of course we shall hope that the members of the congregations from St. Mary's and All Saints,' Hampton will come and worship here with us. It is only right, therefore, that as large a number as possible should journey to St. Mary's, Hampton on the first

two Wednesdays and to All Saints', Hampton on the final Wednesday of the series. Let us all do our best to back up the experiment of the Diocesan Adult Religious Education Committee in their effort to bring fresh zeal and earnestness into our devotional life. In the scheme prepared by this Committee it is suggested that these Corporate Services should be assisted by a meeting of the individual congregations in their own parishes on some other day in the week for a study circle on the "subject" taken at the service. I hope to conduct such a study circle in the Church and Vestry of the Church on the Friday evenings following the five Wednesdays, at 8.15 p.m. God's blessing rest upon our special messenger and our efforts to establish his message. earnestly commend the Lenten Fast to your special observance and hope it may increase in us the spirit of worship and tend to a real spiritual revival in our parish. For reasons over which we had no control we are obliged to postpone our S.P.G. Sunday till February 7th. I am told that the Rev. W. E. Evans who is coming to preach on behalf of the Society is a particularly good man and that we are fortunate in securing him. Such news should make us all the more eager to hear him.

Finance.

The Annual Accounts as presented to the Parochial Church Meeting on January 28th, are printed in this issue.

is far from satisfactory although it shows a balance in hand. Certain repairs to the Church now in hand, will be completed in the near future and payment amounting to £93 2s. 2d. will then be required. The second instalment of £40 for repairs to the organ will be due in the spring. An extra sum of £133 is therefore required at the earliest possible moment.

The cost of upkeep of the churchyard will also be increased in the present year, since the cost of the labour of one man for one day in each week has not been included. This extra labour is necessary in order to keep the new part of the churchyard in order. We would be glad to have many more special Subscriptions for this purpose. This matter is of interest to

all Parishioners whether or no they attend the church and it should be made clear that the P.C.C. has no special income for the purpose, beyond voluntary subscriptions and the Church funds.

- The Charities Account does not require any special remarks since the normal balance is maintained.
- The Magazine Account shows that it was necessary to call upon the P.C.C. to meet a small deficit. This is explained by the fact that a sum of £20 was overdue for Advertisement Charges. Mr. Slaney who had kindly undertaken to collect the advertisement fees, found himself unable to complete the work owing to indifferent health. Some of these arrears are now coming in and will be included in the account for 1932. The actual sales were greater last year than in the year before.

Parish Hall and Club Room Account.

Here we have cause for congratulation. The receipts for letting the Hall and Club Room and rent amount to about £114 more than the cost of upkeep. With the balance in hand we could reduce the Bank loan to a certain amount but have thought it best to hold the money for a few months until we can estimate the receipts for the present year and to meet any small repairs or re-decorations found to be necessary. The Hall has let satisfactorily and Mr. Hallt has found his position as agent for letting the Hall far from being a sinecure. We are grateful to him for his voluntary services and must also acknowledge our debt to Mrs. Stanley who by her own wish has taken a reduced remuneration for her services during the summer months.
