## Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

During the month that is gone we have been settling down for the winter's work. I hope that spiritually and socially all efforts that will be made in our various organisations will tend to a greater unity amongst us all, an increased interest in the affairs of our Church and largely augmented congregations of worshippers at the Church services. I hope to be able to note the success of the first of our social functions in next month's magazine. Please look out for the announcements of further events as they are given each month. Our Harvest Thanksgiving Services will, I hope, be attended by large numbers desirous of offering very real thanks to God for a good harvest.

One event of a spiritual nature should have our attention and that is the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial which is to be held in all parishes in the London Diocese from November 13th to 20th. It is a great opportunity for the renewal in the way of Prayer of all Church people. I am sure that to receive the full spiritual benefit of such an effort requires careful preparation. In anticipation

of this "Week of Prayer," and as a lead in the preparation for it, the new Bishop of Kensington is coming to conduct a Service in St. Mary's Church, Twickenham, on Tuesday, November 8th, at 8 p.m. I do hope that a large number from this Parish will make up their minds to be present at that service. Full details of the services in our own Church during the week of Prayer will be announced in the November magazine.

You will see a notice concerning a Missionary Gift Day elsewhere. In past years quite a number of people from this Parish have attended. Let us increase our numbers on this occasion. Many people who call themselves Christians are still refusing to listen to the call of the Master to his Church to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. I think they forget that the Church in the Mission Field is part of the Church Militant here on earth to which they themselves belong. They also overlook the fact that the people who do not know anything about Jesus and His love have souls and that Christ died for them as well as for us, and further, that, but for the sending of Missionaries to us by the Church people of long ago, we might be in the same miserable, fearful and hopeless state as are those whom many of us are refusing to give the

opportunity of all the benefits which flow from the Grace of God. Apart from any idea of duty, gratitude for the many mercies which we have received should drive us to take a keen interest in and to give as much support as possible to every effort made for the extension of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world.

Up to the present I have been unable to make any definite decision as to the appointment of a permanent Organist and Choirmaster, but I hope to be able to announce the name of the successful candidate early this month.

No one dislikes speaking and writing about money and the parochial need of that medium of exchange more than I do, and yet the lot of many a parish Priest is made difficult and sometimes unhappy because he has to be constantly urging the members of the Church to bear their equitable share in the upkeep of their Church. When we put before you the needs of your Church and suggest in the best way possible that your subscription is due we are not begging, we are just reminding you of your obligation as members of the Church by Baptism. The basis of Church finance should be Church membership rather than Church-going membership. Will you please take note of this? And when you see the needs of the parish placed before you in the magazine, just say to yourselves "my subscription is long overdue I must send it a long!" And so do at once before it slips your memory.
