Confirmation.

The Confirmation this year will be at All Saints' Church early in December. The Vicar would be glad to have the names of the intending candidates during the first week in September. At the end of the Baptism Service the Godparents are told to "take care" that their Godchild "be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him so soon as he (she) can say the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments in the vulgar tongue, and be further instructed in the Church Catechism set forth for that purpose." The responsibility is spread over three persons. How many Godparents to-day remember their responsibility? Those who do not are guilty of turning a very solemn instruction into a farce. It is a pity that while parents and others would not dream of neglecting to take care that boys and girls in whom they were particularly interested did not fail to make full use of any opportunity which would help them in their material and worldly life, they do not seem to trouble whether they receive the Blessing from God of strength to help them in their spiritual lives and to make them better men and women. These young people may be able to attain to the world's standard of living without Confirmation, but they cannot reach God's standard of living without His help, which, according to the Church is given in Confirmation. And further it is becoming more and more a matter of obligation with parents to see that their children take all the advantages offered by the educational system of to-day in preparation for life's work in this world. It is, however, a matter of honour with Godparents to be careful that their Godchildren receive all the spiritual privileges offered in the educational system of the Church in their preparation for citizenship in the Kingdom of God. Godparents are in honour bound to present their Godchildren for Confirmation.

Literature.

The Editor in last month's issue mentioned several periodicals which Church people would do well to read because, by doing so, they would gain an intelligent interest in the work of their Church in the world, the Diocese, in parishes other than their own and in the various Church organisations which do not form part of parochial or diocesan life as such. "The Church Assembly News" e.g. is the official rogan of the National Church Assembly. This body is the recognised governing body of the Church of England. It meets periodically to legislate for the whole of the Church and many of the bills it has formulated have passed into law, such as the Parochial Church Meeting Measure, the Dilapidations Measure and the Clergy Pensions Measure. If we want to be kept up to date about its doings a quarter of an hour spent each month on reading its Publication named above will be sufficient to gather some knowledge of what is being done. The Bishop of Sodor and Man in his Diocesan Letter expressed a wish that the clergy and laity of his Diocese could have been present at the Summer Session of the Church Assembly in order that they may gain a "first-hand knowledge

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of the splendid service the Assembly is rendering for the administration of the Church of England." Most Church people cannot be present at these sessions but they can get a very good second-hand knowledge of the Assembly's work by reading "The Church Assembly News."
