### WHAT DO WE MEAN BY "THE GOSPEL"?

### THE BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY.

One hears much of the Red Cross in war—but its Peace-time activities are often not heeded. Yet in Peace as in War the B.R.C.S. functions untiringly—and is a real friend to the ordinary man in the street. We quote a few of the activities which might be of service and help to you:— There are the medical loan depots

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where medical equipment is loaned on the advice of a Doctor or Nurse, to people who are ill at home. Welfare work to sick and disabled and their families, and invalid foods are provided; also Day Nurseries, After-care and emergency help to disabled ex-servicemen, Hospital Libraries, Hospital Car Service and Ambulances to take the Sick and Infirm to Hospital. Old people receive constant attention—meals are taken to them. Clubs are run to give companionship and Pensioners are visited. Escorts are provided when needed to travellers who are crippled, elderly or sick. Red Cross members supplement staffs in hospitals—and if required they assist in the home with Nursing duties.

The Red Cross must also be ready to perform its duties in War. It is therefore, training men and women between the ages of 16 and 65 in First-Aid and Home Nursing. In this Borough of Twickenham, Teddington, and the Hamptons there is a very large Red Cross Division, with six Women's detachments, and one Men's and Cadet Units for boys and girls between the ages of 11 to 16. Red Cross members are being recruited daily, and are always needed. We are sure you would be interested and happy to join your nearest Detachment—and have the companionship of a Club; the help of their lectures on First-Aid and Home Nursing and to

take part in some of the many duties. It is *not* necessary to give *all* your time:—one evening a week to the Lecture and Practice, and other duties are purely optional. We need new members and we need your help. The local Headquarters are at 59, Kings Parade, Twickenham—where you will be welcomed and given further information and the address of the Commandant of your nearest Detachment.
