A CALL FOR HELPERS

The Horder Centres for Athritics is a young national charity which aims to help badly disabled and housebound arthritics — those who have been told—"Nothing more can

be done for you."

The slenderness of our resources unfortunately hinders the opening of our first residential Centre in the immediate future, but does not prevent our Branches of Centres Helpers' springing up all over the country. The members befriend the housebound arthritics and do all in their power to make their hard lot a little easier to bear. We are aware of the splendid work done amongst the disabled by several organizations and are careful that the activities of our Helpers do not overlap with the work of other bodies.

Our Helpers make friendly and quite informal calls once or twice a week, bring in shopping, or do mending or letter-writing for those whose hands are too badly crippled

to hold needle or pen.

We urgently need volunteers as Helpers to come forward in every area, including Hampton Hill and District. Please do not hold back because you do not like the idea of visiting strangers. There is no room for shyness when there are people who sit and lie within the same four walls, in constant pain and desperately needing friendship from one year's end to the other. There are very few healthy people who with a little planning, a small sacrifice of free time, cannot spare a short time every week to cheer up one of these unfortunate arthritics. Members of Branches who are car-owners or who are strong enough to push a wheel-chair, can give great pleasure to those arthritics who are not entirely stiff and helpless, by taking them for occasional outings. To an active person who takes his or her ability to travel around for granted, such an outing may seem hardly worth offering, but to those who never get out, the sight of new faces and the most ordinary streets and shops gives long remembered joy.

To those who are entirely housebound through arthritis, we would like to send this message, "Friends are on the way, so do not despair.' From a hospital in North India, a C.M.S. missionary writes to tell of the joy which comes from shared daily worship with the school, staff

and boarders. She says:
"An Indian Sister and I share the teaching and hospital work, and with nine in training, we are blessed with a good nursing staff. And now I would ask for your special prayers for the hospital Bible woman. She is a wonderful witness for Christ. She is deformed, for years her eye-sight has been failing and she is fast going blind, but she has such happy, thankful heart. patients and their relatives enjoy sitting with her, and seem so impressed by her teaching.

"Many years ago she was unwanted by her Muslim family, and since becoming a Christian, desire is that others should seek to

enter the Kingdom of God."
