STEWARDSHIP HAS TO DO WITH THE WHOLE OF LIFE

This month many of you who read this will be receiving a letter about the stewardship of your time and talents, and then a visitor will call to discuss with you opportunities of service in the parish and in wider spheres beyond. There are things that God wants to get done, and He wants us to do them, as "workers together with Him" and as stewards of all the gifts which we hold in trust from Him. "It's you that are chosen now for this thing God has in mind, a thing so fitted to your life that it won't get done in exactly that way unless you do it." It is good that we should find what "this thing" is, if we haven't already done so, and enter more deeply a course of life that not only enriches and fulfils our own personalities, but also glorifies God and blesses our neighbour.

STEWARDSHIP CONFERENCE, SATURDAY, MAY 14, 1966

The Lord Bishop says that Stewardship is bringing a sense of unity to "amorphous mass" of the Diocese. Success acts as stimulus for reluctant parishes.

The Rev. J. C. Matheson on Stewardship Continuation: Every Christian must ask himself "Why am I a member of the Church and what does my membership mean to me in terms of mission. Do I even appreciate what mission is?" "Use the vast potential tapped by Christian Stewardship outwardly — don't turn in on yourselves congregations, get out into the main stream of the Church's life in the world." Liberality must never be confined by stewardship of money or time. There must indeed be disciplined giving but it is the spontaneous giving out of gratitude to God that is the essence of true religion. In times of stress man wants to share with "his kind" — this is an act of communion natural to humans but Man's vision of who is "his kind" needs widening. The whole of mankind is now Man's neighbour. Religion is in danger of being regarded by many as mere spiritualism but this conception is far divorced from Christ's practical "down to earth" teaching.

The Rev. Dewi Morgan - commenting on "The Long March": Stewardship could be seen as God's plan for the twentieth century — a time of unprecedented revolution — a total world whose inhabitants are in touch as never before in history through increasing literacy, radio and television. Christ said "The things that I do, do you also, and greater things than I do, shall YE do." Where Christ fed the five thousand modern Man could feed five million if he only would. One man on a donkey and on foot performed wonders — what should the Christian of today not be able to achieve towards making God's will done on earth as it is in Heaven?

The Archdeacon of London: The Church is made up of the people of God. If You believe in God YOU are the Church. The Church can be alive only through YOU. The young particularly are tired of mere theological argument, they want to see Christian action and to hear relevant prayers arising out of the experience of those praying. The Church is the Body of Christ and WE should walk about the world today as His Body, His Hands and His Word.

The Diocesan Council for Mission will be responsible for stage two of Stewardship (Time and Talents) and stage three (The Ministry of the Laity). Their first project for next spring will be "The People Next

Door" and will be in two parts, I — Study and II — Activity! Read "The Seeds of Peace" by Dewi Morgan — "The dramatic story of how one man saw Christian Aid in action" and "Yes to Mission" by Canon Webster.

The Conference proved so inspiring that by unanimous acclaim it M.O.

was decided to hold one annually!

THE BIBLE IN EVERYDAY LIFE

Bible Reading Fellowship Reading for the week following Christian Aid Week:

Ezekiel 36, v. 33 . . .

"Thus said the Lord God: In the day that I cleanse you from all your iniquities" (and blindness to our neighbour's need is iniquity) "I will cause the cities to be inhabited and waste places shall be builded. And the land that was desolate shall be tilled, whereas it was a desolation in the sight of all that passed by. And they shall say, This land that was desolate is become like the garden of Eden, and the waste and desolate and ruined places are fenced and inhabited. Then the nations that are left round about you shall know that I the Lord have builded the ruined places, and planted that which was desolate; I THE LORD HAVE SPÔKEN IT ÂND I WILL DO IT."

Anyone who has seen The Long March or read Dewi Morgan's book The Seeds of Peace and knows that through Christian Aid Persian villages ravished by earthquake are being rebuilt, forests ruined by war are being replanted, plains denuded by drought are being watered by dams and water systems, will testify to the practical truth of the above quotation.

And to a parish that a little while ago was almost dead and that is finding new life and vitality under the impetus of Christian Stewardship:

Ezekiel 37, v. 1-10.

"And he said unto me, Son of man, can these dry bones live? and I answered, O Lord God, thou knowest . . . O ye dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus saith the Lord God unto these bones: Behold I will cause breath to enter into you and ye shall live . . . and breath came into them and they lived, and stood up on their feet, an exceeding great army."

And a prayer for the beginnings of the stewardship of time and

talent:

"Oh Lord God, who hast called thy servants to ventures of which they cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing whither we go, but only that Thy hand is leading us, and Thy love supporting us." (B.R.F., May 21st, 1966).

PROGRAMME OF SONG AND RECITATION

To conclude Christian Aid Week at Evensong on Sunday, May 22, instead of a sermon, a series of dramatic recitations and music entitled 'I am the World's Surplus Man' was given by the Hampton Council of Churches led by the indefatigable Mrs. Eustace.

St. James's rang with the resonant voices of the men and the clear tones of the ladies declaring the plight of the people in under-developed and over-populated countries and behind the Iron Curtain and extolling

the help which Christian Aid is giving.

Interposed between the utterances were campaign songs of the Christian Aid Movement accompanied on the guitar by Richard Cox, including one song by Raymond Draper and the Youth Fellowship which was in the 'Top Twenty' of the Christian Aid National Song competition. Felicity Hammond sang solo sweetly and movingly.

Although the congregation was not over-large the presentation sent many away with the resolve to help Christian Aid in the excellent work being carried out overseas.

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS ADOPT A LEPER BOY

Our boy — Gundar — is 14. He lives in the N.E. of India, and symptons of leprosy were recently discovered in his hands and fingers. He is now in a LEPRA colony, and if his treatment can be sustained, he will be cured.

Mrs. Rockliffe first introduced the scheme to the Sunday Schools, and told the children stories of the boys in Africa which her own family had adopted. The teachers and children were much impressed by what she said, and Mrs. Brunt was asked to make enquiries to see if we could adopt a boy of our own. This has now been arranged, and photos and particulars of Gundar have been displayed on our bookstall. To support him and pay for his treatment will cost £16 a year, and we recently sent our first contribution of £4. All monies (except of course pledged-giving envelopes) now given in our Sunday Schools are for Gundar, and we know that many children are contributing from their own pocket money (not forgetting to put some aside for any Sundays that they may be absent), and not just bringing money from their parents.

Members of that branch were hostesses and had prepared and served most delectable refreshments.
